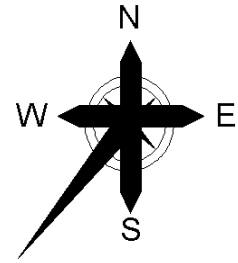

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON MEETING ENDS GOLDEN RUN

After having run for 55 years, our Wednesday Afternoon Meeting has wound up.

Initially started as a Joint Chalmers/Thornlie Group away back in the 60s this Group, over the years, has attracted many of our older members for fellowship between 2 and 3pm.

Sadly, numbers have declined over many years now and the Committee have reluctantly decided to wind up the group and await the development of some other Wednesday activity.

The dedication and commitment of the many Committee members over all those years is something to celebrate and for which to thank God. There are too many individuals to mention here but special mention must be made of the work and dedication of the late **Doris Watt** and, following Doris, **Mary Louise Archibald** and **Alexa Knott** to whom the Kirk Session has recorded its special thanks.

The first meeting was on 23rd March 1960 in Thornlie Church Hall before transferring to Chalmers Church Hall chaired by respective ministers, namely Rev G I Griffiths and Rev Cameron Wallace on a week about basis. The format was opening hymn, prayer, soloist, hymn, tea, offering, hymn, talk, soloist, vote of thanks and closing hymn. All hymns were from the Redemption Hymn Book. Mr Jimmy Marshall was pianist and Mr Matt Reid led the singing with 70 members attending the first meeting.

An outing was held in June every year. There was a Christmas Dinner and a closing social.

It was a happy, friendly meeting and through it many lasting friendships were formed.



What Messy Church is

Letter from the Manse

Can you believe it has only been six months since I became your Minister here at SWPC? I can't. I loved the cartoon in the last magazine which said that the new Minister had hit the ground running. This was a pun on my preaching style of walking around when I preach but it also symbolises the busyness that comes at the start of any new ministry.

I know many of you have felt that you have had to start running along with me just to try to keep up. Others have started running in order to try to find out what is going on. This reminds me of my time working in the Prison Service in London when an emergency call would go out for officers to attend a disturbance somewhere in the prison. There were occasions when you hadn't heard the call but all of a sudden this herd of uniformed officers would come charging by. In kicked your training and you would find yourself jogging on the spot until there a space for you to join in with the others without knowing where you were going or what was happening. All you knew was it was your job to help, to get involved. In the prison service security was everyone's' responsibility.

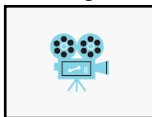

Local Church Review:

The Church of Scotland has a system where each of its Churches is visited every five years.

A new system is now in place where we will be visited by a Team from Hamilton Presbytery but this visit is designed to encourage rather than inspect the congregations.

To this end, when Congregation is visited they will have provided the visiting team with what we see as its vision for the future outlining what is known as its SMART objectives i.e. Specific, Manageable, Attainable, Resourced and Time Limited.

We in South Wishaw are due to have a LCR by the end of 2016. To prepare for this the Kirk Session will shortly be forming a Team to complete the necessary papers.

2016 General Assembly

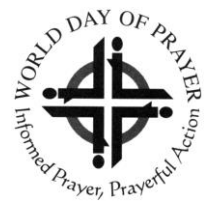
South Wishaw is commissioned to attend this year's General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in May. Our Minister and Presbytery Elder will be our representatives.

SOUTH WISHAW ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS



In South Wishaw Parish Church during 2015 we had a special service during Holy Week on Good Friday. On Easter Sunday we enjoyed a family meal in the hall after our normal worship service. During the meal we joined in a celebration of Holy Communion in an informal and all age setting.



We also joined other churches in Wishaw during the 'World Day of Prayer' Our Church Worship Group enhances and assists with our Praise during our regular Sunday Services and also contribute to other Social occasions in the Church life

Other Special Services held during the year included a Remembrance Day Service The praise during this particular service was led by the Coalburn Silver Band. The various branches of our Scout Group and Guide Unit paraded to a Special Service in the afternoon designed for that age Group. This was attended by an increased number of parents and guardians of the Scout/Guide membership.

At Christmas we celebrated the birth of Christ. Our Noah's Ark, Lighthouse and Manna Groups all participated in a Nativity presentation. The Younger Groups held a Christmas Party while the Older Group enjoyed a more active

and adventurous activity at a later date. We worshipped on Christmas Eve with Carols and Praise and enjoyed a Christmas Day Family Service. Our Worship Group presented 'Come Messiah King' as a separate and well attended local community event.

We celebrated Communion in March, June, September and December at the invitation of the Kirk Session. Our Morning Communion Services followed a formal pattern with a 3pm Communion Services being of an informal nature.



Our Noah's Ark, Lighthouse and Manna Groups meet each Sunday and join the Congregation at an appropriate time during the Service having firstly participated in activities designed for their particular age group. Facilities for a Creche are also available during the Service..

In August of 2015 we were pleased to welcome Rev Terence Moran as our new Minister.

He and his family have now settled into life in Wishaw and he has already made his presence felt in suggesting and implementing some changes to our Service format

COMMUNICATING WITH OUR COMMUNITY

The Church Web Site secures a substantial number of recorded hits. The Compass, our Church News Bulletin, is published every 3 months and is made available on line. This provides an adequate record of our Church events and activities. The Church holds all of the necessary and relevant copyright licences. We had two Children's Holiday Clubs in the year and have recently begun a new initiative by organising 'Messy Church' events.

The Church premises are used as a convenient Polling Station for

General, Scottish Government, Local Government and European Elections and by a number of community groups for regular or occasional events. The local Citizens' Advice Centre and the Church have established a Partnership that allows access to a computer suite on the Church premises. This enables the local community to complete and access benefit facilities

A number of our Youth Leaders attended an all Scotland Youth Leaders Course in 2015 thus widening their knowledge and expertise which is then passed on through our Youth Groups to the young people of the community.

Adult Groups meeting regularly in our Church include Guild and Fellowship Groups that are open to all, on occasions, they have joint functions. Our Wednesday



Afternoon Group decided to stop operating in December of 2015 having run continuously for

55 years. Our Thursday Sharing Circle continues to attracted a core of members. All of these Groups are attended by members of our Church and local community and are a source of outreach and mission, We continue to run a weekly Prayer Group each Wednesday Morning as well as two Bible Discussion Groups both of which are enthusiastically supported by our own members and others from local churches

We run a Community Cafe on Saturday mornings staffed by members of the Church on a rota basis. This helps provide income to



sustain our range of activities. During the Cafe we have a Traidcraft stall where a range of fair traded goods are sold and (Continued on page 5)

proceeds used to assist Traidcraft in their world wide activities. This stall also operates on a Sunday during our after service fellowship gatherings.

A community based Drama Group continues to meet each Tuesday afternoon and a Highland Dancing Class for young people meets twice a week in our main hall. There is a Mothers' and Toddlers' Group using the premises on two mornings each week and we have taken this Group into the Church Family and freed them from financial burdens

The Motherwell and Wishaw Amateur Operatic Society use our facilities for occasional practices and the premises are also made available for Children's Birthday parties when and where space permits. This facility has grown in popularity throughout the year Our Summer Fete was again a huge success. This as now an indoor event following the refurbishment of the premises. The Fete attracts a large number of people from the town, local community and our membership. This again helps us maintain contact with the local community as well as providing a valuable source of income. Our Children's Holiday Clubs are an established feature of both our Church and Community calendars. We held two of these during 2015. The increasing numbers attending is greatly encouraging.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

The refurbishment of parts of our premises continued during 2015 and saw the installation of an upgraded Sound System, Large Screen and Data Projector. These facilities are planned to be used for Congregational and Community Social Events. Our Church Manse was completely upgraded for the arrival of our new Minister and his family. We hear mention of it being now too hot.

The paving slabs at the entrances to Church and Hall have now all been re-laid by members of our Property Group under the direction of our Property Convener. Some other property problems are being investigated

During 2015 we completed the Financial part of our Stewardship 'Give to Grow' Programme. The Congregation responded well and the final result was seen as being very encouraging. Consideration of other Stewardship responsibilities continues.

- Popular Speaker, Robert Nimmo, rewarded us with a talk on Ireland.
- Some illnesses of members have occurred recently – must be the time of year – but we seem to be proceeding well.

PROPERTY GROUP



Representatives of our Property Group have recently conducted a review of storage facilities on our premises. It became clear during his review that there is an obvious and serious lack of suitable space to enable groups to operate efficiently.

The wooden Annexe, that houses a large amount of equipment, is now beyond economical repair and will require attention sooner rather than later. The Congregational Board has recently agreed to purchase a large container and that should help improve the current situation but some other rearrangement of available facilities will also be necessary. To assist with this we will have to assess the need for a number of items of equipment that are currently stored on the premises.



The siting of the container will cause some reduction in space available in the turning circle at the bottom of the Church car park making it essential that the 'NO PARKING' arrangement in that space is enforced. It should be again emphasised that parking on the hall entrance driveway is only allowed for loading/unloading purposes and accessible access.

TOILETS

In comparison with the remainder of the Church halls and facilities, our toilets are now looking decidedly dated. Some updating is now very much on the minds of our property group.

FLAT ROOFS

The recent downpours have resulted in some serious damage to the flat roofs above the Vestry, Hall vestibule and Computer Suite (Old Kitchen). Inspection shows that the only answer is a complete replacement of the roof coverings. This will be attended to as soon as a spell of suitable weather becomes available. The stone work pointing on most of the Church building is now also in need of some serious attention



CHURCH FLOWERS –

A big thank you to all who have donated flowers for the Sanctuary, or have given donations to the Flower Fund. These flowers are much appreciated by those who receive them.

The new flower calendar is now well underway and is in the front vestibule. Spaces are still available so feel free to add your name to it when passing.

Worship Group -

I am going to start by thanking everyone who came to see *Come Messiah King* in December. It was an excellent night and I am sure you'll agree that the worship group excelled themselves - as did our soloists Caitlin and Terry. With only eight weeks of rehearsal, I was very impressed not only with everyone's musicality but also the professionalism shown in rehearsals and in performance. I only wish we were able to perform it more than once.

In other news, our performances at Cambusnethan and St Mark's churches in December went down very well with the audiences where we sang a mixture of spiritual songs, beautiful folk tunes and excerpts from *Come Messiah King*. The in January we sang here in South Wishaw at the Scottish Night, which was also a fantastic night for everyone who came.

Our next performance will be at St John's in Carluke, making a return visit after singing there in December 2014. Then it's on to Easter, when we will perform a short spiritual musical on Easter Sunday – similar in musical style to what we performed at Christmas. It is called *Kingdom, Power, Glory!* And the worship group have already started to sink their teeth into it. I really look forward to being able to share it with you!!
